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### **PDW-LIS 2024**

### Professional Development Workshop on Library & Information Services

The exposure trip overseas aims to provide participants from the Maldives with a comprehensive understanding of the latest trends and innovations in library and information science (LIS) in other countries. The guided tours supplemented with workshop sessions offer participants an opportunity to explore state-of-the-art libraries and institutes that have embraced digital technologies, innovative services, and interactive learning spaces.

#### **Specific Objectives**

- Explore advanced library and information services concepts and emerging trends in the field.
- Understand the role of libraries in the digital age and their impact on knowledge dissemination.
- Discover innovative technologies and services implemented in modern information services.
- Gain insights into library management practices, including collection development and user engagement strategies.
- Foster networking opportunities with LIS professionals, researchers, and fellow participants.

#### **PD Workshop Series**

The professional development workshop was introduced as a supplementary annual learning event with the initiation of the final-year students of the first cohort of Bachelor of Arts (Library and Information Management) [BA.LIM] of the Maldives National University. BA.LIM course was approved by the Maldives Qualifications Authority in 2021 and the first batch of students graduated in May 2024. The first workshop was conducted in Singapore, in 2023, titled 'BALIM/MLA Professional Development Workshop for Librarians (PDWL)'. The Professional Development Workshop 2024 was hosted in Indonesia.

- Established in 2009, the Faculty of Arts (FA), MNU has been at the forefront of developing and training human resources in the country, focusing on humanities and selected areas of social sciences. With a brief yet esteemed history of academic achievements, the FA currently provides a diverse range of courses spanning political science, journalism, public relations, visual arts, international relations, native and foreign languages & linguistics, and culture.
- FA commenced the first long-term in-country program in Library and Information Science (LIS) in 2010 as the Advanced Certificate in Library and Information Services (ACLIS) course. This was followed by the Diploma of Library and Information Services (DLIS) course launched in 2012. The MNU Bachelor of Arts (Library and Information Management) (BA-LIM) course was approved by the Maldives Qualifications Authority in 2021, making it the first, MQA-approved, in-country degree program in LIS.
- Seven students from the first batch and seven students from BA-LIM participated in this PDW held in Indonesia, with aspirations to gain much needed exposure to compliment the theoretical lessons.
- While the study tour is not an official part of the BA-LIM course, the FA has actively encouraged the initiative.

- The Maldives Library Association
  (MLA) was formed in 1987. MLA
  continuously strives to provide
  professional development for
  librarians and uplift and develop
  libraries in the Maldives. With the
  shortage of library professionals in
  the Maldives, MLA faces many
  challenges in its endeavors and yet
  continues to be a changemaker.
- One of the significant achievements in recent years has been the introduction of Koha, an opensource library management software, to the Maldivian community. This initiative has been further strengthened by offering ongoing training programs on Koha.
- This professional development program in Indonesia was held with partial sponsorship from MLA and is a unique opportunity for local librarians. Thirteen librarians joined this program in Indonesia through affiliation to the MLA.

- Forum Perpustakaan Perguruan Tinggi Indonesia (FPPTI), known also as the Forum for Indonesian Higher Education Libraries, is an organisation dedicated to enhancing the role and quality of libraries within higher education institutions across Indonesia.
- FPPTI organises workshops and training programs for library staff to improve their skills and keep them updated with the latest developments in library science and technology.
- Regular seminars and conferences are held to discuss contemporary issues in library management and to share best practices.
- By focusing on the continuous professional development of library staff, FPPTI helps in building a knowledgeable and skilled workforce capable of managing modern libraries efficiently.


# Program Organisers & Facilitators An international collaboration of LIS professionals

## INFORAMTION SESSIONS AND GUIDED TOURS

PDW-LIS 2024 offered a variety of Guided Tours to Libraries and Related Information Service Institutions. The itinerary included guided visits and information sessions that cover

- University Library
- Public Library
- School Library
- Community Reading Room
- Archive
- Museum
- Room To Read

An overview of each of these visits is presented on the following pages.



Room to Read is a non-profit organisation dedicated to eradicating illiteracy and gender inequality around the world. They do this by establishing and supporting child-friendly libraries, implementing literacy and girls' education programs, and collaborating with local publishers, authors, and illustrators to create high-quality children's books. According to their website, Room to Read has reached more than 39 million children in 24 countries.

The Room to Read, Surabaya team, provided the participants with an overview of their activities focusing on the Child-Friendly Library Model that has been implemented in East Java. The key discussions focused on their educational initiatives, particularly in improving literacy and gender equality in education. The information session was delivered by Pak **Kus Wanto** and colleagues



The team shared insights on their ongoing projects, highlighting successful outcomes and challenges. The participants were also gifted samples of some of the children's books that has been produced by the Indonesia Room to Read initiative. The participants had many questions about exploring opportunities for collaboration between Maldives and Room to Read to support literacy and reading programs and libraries for a better service to Maldives children.



The first guided tour in the 2024 PDW on library and information services in Indonesia was to the Library at Universitas Kristen Petra (Petra Christian University - PCU) in Surabaya. The team of librarians at PCU explained the central showpiece project titled "Surabaya Memory" using archival pictures, and provided an overview of the library services as well as a quick glimpse of the variety of spaces within the library. The library established in 1966 is dedicated to creating an environment that nurtures a rich learning experience and follows the motto, "A Caring Learning Zone," reflecting their commitment to being more than just a traditional library.

## **Participant Observations**

- I found the Self Check Desk for quick book borrowing and a specialised Help Corner for students with special needs, ensuring accessibility and convenience for all users, to be the best aspect.
- PCU library truly stood out as a caring learning zone. Everything, from the cosy reading spaces to the thoughtful use of archival photos, made students feel supported and connected to the past.
- The dedication of the staff was surprising and we need to emulate that to draw the users towards the library. The Maldives libraries could replicate this blend of care, history, and comfort, creating inviting and memorable spaces for everyone.
- PCU Library is a spacious and comfortable environment to study.
- The library plays a huge role in involving students in different activities. I liked the area in the PCU Library allocated to portray student's artwork.

- The 'A' accreditation is the best aspect. I think Maldives libraries should also start rating the libraries so that the organisations work harder to get accreditation, thereby fueling innovation and improved services.
- Implementing collaborative rooms with minimal expenditure is possible.
- The creation of cosy reading corners or study spaces within the library, and spaces such as quiet study areas, group discussion rooms, and multimedia stations can be replicated in the Maldives libraries.
- Photo exhibitions showcasing the past.
- Exhibition space for students can create a vibrant community feeling.
- 'Liaison librarians' for subject expertise.
- Research support services.
- Laptops to lend will be excellent. To start with 2 or 3 laptops will be fine.
- Creating a coffee/tea corner inside our libraries can significantly enhance the user experience by offering a comfortable space for relaxation and informal study.

- It is impressive that the students have their own digital media platforms. The best aspect of SMA Khadija's library was how they engaged students as media teams.
- SMA Khadija library was such a small library and so well organised and arranged. It was truly impressive.
- The love and respect I saw from the students towards the librarians was a welcoming feeling and observation. I hope that we also will reach such a place in the future, where the library profession is loved and respected.
- Student empowerment was very much established in this library, and I am sure that the students graduating from this school would be confident and very successful, due to the role the libraries played in their lives.
- The seating concept also stood out as particularly effective. Everyone is so humble, students as well as adults.
- Displaying the creativity of students was amazing.
- The library's best aspect is its emphasis on integrating technology with traditional resources. This includes digital media literacy programs that help students learn essential skills in finding information online and using digital tools effectively.
- The arrangement inside the library and how many activities they carry out for users even though the collection was not that big is very impressive.

- Removing chairs and desks to make libraries more spacious with shoe-less carpeted seating spaces.
- Maldives could replicate the idea of involving students in library activities, such as forming media or library support teams. This would foster a sense of ownership and responsibility among students without incurring much cost.
- Maldives libraries such as Centre for Higher Secondary Education, Villa International High School or even primary school libraries could set up a student blog or newsletter where students can contribute content related to their studies, interests, or local culture, which would not require a significant budget. It can encourage reading and creativity.
- Having social media platforms for the library and letting selected students handle them would be something we can do. We can have a Library Club in schools with members from each class who could help the librarians to carry on different programs.





Airlangga University (Universitas Airlangga – UNAIR) is one of the oldest universities in Indonesia. UNAIR is one of the top public universities in Surabaya and is ranked #308 in current QS World University Rankings. The UNAIR library is divided over three campus locations.

### **Participant Observations**

- The best part of Airlangga University Library tour was the interactive information session they provided us.
- This is one big library with many facilities and resources. I find all their resources very interesting.
- I liked the 'Movio' room, which is the audio and video room.
- Spacious and comfortable environment to study in.
- Learning Area: Individual access to CDs, DVDs, and more for knowledge and entertainment. Collaboration Area: A space for group discussions and events. Creativity Area: Equipped for video editing and content creation. Studio Area: A controlled environment for podcast production and media recordina.
- I was fascinated that their university library is open to the public and other university students. This creates higher usage. Additionally, the fact that they count visits and usage of both physical and online collections and the participation of users in library sessions caught my attention.
- Carpeted area with low tables. They also provided Zoomax which would be very helpful to read small prints, and also it would be a helpful tool for those with vision problems.
- The concept of a dedicated podcast room which provides students with a space to create audio content, useful for both academic and creative projects.
- They conduct various programs, workshops and events to promote learning. Besides the excellent environment for learning and research, computers, printers, wifi are also provided for users to enhance their learning experience. Although replicating such a room can be costly, parents and teachers can prepare the budget with fundraising events.

- Our libraries should be able to easily create a collaborative reading space at low cost.
- The UNAIR Podcast is a great idea that public and academic libraries in Maldives could use. It is a fun and easy way to share information, interviews, and book reviews with the community.
- Podcasting is the most exciting idea that could help Maldives libraries connect with more people.
- I think we can replicate the audio and video room concept without too much cost.
- Similar to UNAIR, I think MNU can also start opening the library to the general public as ours is such a small country. This change would benefit many.
- The spaces are arranged very comfortably and these changes can be done with minimal expenditure.
- We can have a small carpeted area without furniture (or low tables) so that users can sit on the floor at their convenience.
- Plan for regular statistics capture of library usage and address areas that need improvement.
- The reference section is inventory checked every two years and the way of tagging those is something which can be used in our libraries.
- We can adopt Airlanga Uni Library's approach to accessibility services of special programs for students with disabilities.
- Rooms for quiet discussion and special decorative spaces for reading can be easily created in school libraries to enhance students' learning experience.





The University of Surabaya (Ubaya) is a private university founded in 1968. It is one of Indonesia's leading institutions for higher education, known for its academic excellence and innovation. The library began modernising its systems by introducing computerised cataloguing and circulation systems in the 1990s. This was part of a broader push to keep up with technological advancements and improve resource accessibility. With the advent of the internet, in the 2000s the Ubaya Library shifted towards digital collections, offering access to academic databases, e-books, and online journals. The library has continued modernising its facilities, and digital services, improved study spaces, and enhanced user support.

### **Participant Observations**

- UBAYA library was a surprise, combining traditional and modern aesthetics in its architecture and interior design.
- I enjoyed their innovative and supportive environment for learning with modern design and facilities accommodating individual study and group collaboration.
- The library offers comfortable and aesthetically pleasing spaces that encourage reading and learning. The reading corner, with its cosy swing chairs and beanbags, is a comfortable inviting space for readers. So are the group reading pods.
- The corners got my attention, as we can also replicate corners like the Arabic corner and keep books and materials related to Islam and the Arabic Language.
- I loved the posters/messaging on the shelf, and the frames. The reusable frames ease the replacement of the messaging.
- The inspirational quotes displayed on the sides of the shelves immediately draw attention. Reading areas were set with a calming vibe which pulls the readers.
- The museum titled "Museum Wayang" right at the entrance draws people into the library.
- Like the other libraries we visited, the staff attracted me the most-- their humbleness and how they greeted us.
- The cinema hall and the museum corner were interesting.

#### Quick Takeaway Ideas to Replicate

- We could easily replicate the idea of the inspirational quotes on each shelf to create a more engaging atmosphere.
- The Insight Corner, a unique space for reflection and deeper learning, is another great idea we could replicate.
- Their way of spine labelling was unique. It can be useful for libraries with a small collection as the label carries only one alphabet of the title/author.
- The biggest problem for us is the space for libraries. If we had enough space, we should replicate a cosy area for reading and create a cinema/theatre space.
- In our libraries, we can replicate a permanent collection of traditional items and items inherited from the island/city.
- Implement mobile library services to reach remote areas and underserved communities. A small vehicle equipped with books and basic resources can bring the library experience to more people even without significant investment.
- Should explore replicating and adopting movable furniture, modular walls, and flexible room layouts to maximise library usage.

The Surabaya Public Library, known as *Perpustakaan Umum Kota Surabaya*, serves as the central public library for the city of Surabaya. Managed by the Surabaya City Government, the library serves as an essential community hub for education, culture, and knowledge sharing, playing a crucial role in promoting literacy, education, and access to knowledge for the city's residents. One of the key features is the Child-Friendly Information Center "PISA program" (*Pusat Informasi Sahabat Anak*). It is an initiative focused on providing integrated information services tailored to the needs of children. The program promotes child-friendly resources and literacy activities to foster the development of children's potential. The Surabaya Public Library supports educational initiatives by collaborating with schools, universities, and local organisations. The library is centrally located and designed to be accessible to the general public. It offers flexible hours to accommodate visitors.

### **Participant Observations**

- When I read about this library, I assumed it would be huge with many floors. However, it was a one-floor library. It was even more surprising how well they arranged their whole collection. It is a small library that is very well-managed.
- The Library Room with a Dyxlesia Corner and computer activities for children with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) was inspiring.
- Braille books are also provided. The PISA program is excellent. It shows this library tries to cater to a diverse population.
- The library was filled with a variety of resources and services for people of all ages. The best aspects of this library are the cultural events, educational workshops, and country corners dedicated to other cultures. One thing that stood out to me was the diverse books all written in their language 'Bahasa'.
- The best aspect was the wide range of collections they provide for the public and the dedication to their language. The library provides language classes for free.

- It was unique to see many different services in one building which serves the Surabaya community. We could also offer our islands and our communities similar services, especially to people with special needs.
- Host storytelling, workshops, or support groups for children with special needs or seniors.
- Support for Dyslexic and ADHD children.
   Can set up a playroom with games and activities using simple local resources.
- Public libraries in our country can gather more ideas and involve the public in different activities such as free courses.
- The National Library of Maldives as a public library could replicate the idea of spreading reading service points across the Maldives, such as proposing to establish a small and simple space (a reading corner or a mini library) within the island council offices or maybe even within school premises, which would greatly benefit the whole island community as there are no libraries in the islands other than the school libraries.
- The sign language programs designed to make resources accessible to the deaf and hard-of-hearing community, along with the dyslexia corner equipped with specialised software for dyslexic individuals, are excellent initiatives that promote inclusivity. We can replicate it.
- Public libraries can introduce Dhivehi language corners and free classes focusing on migrant workers, and families and also to the Maldivian children.





Universitas Muhammadiyah Malang (UMM) is a private university known for its strong focus on education, research, and community service, offering a wide range of programs across various disciplines. The visit to UMM Library offered a glimpse into a well-structured academic environment that emphasises traditional learning resources and modern technology to support student success. Before the guided tour, the participants were provided with an overview of UMM. Vice Chancellor IV Muhamad Salis Yuniardi, M.Psi., Ph.D., chaired the welcome meeting.

### **Participant Observations**

- The university is so big, and impressive. So is the library.

  Besides their impressive interior design, I have gained ideas for developing one corner of our library focusing on the Dhivehi language and local traditions and customs. Besides this, the fact that the university hosts a ground for agriculture was also impressive and could be something the MNU can replicate.
- UMM library offers a spacious and comfortable study environment and a separate room/area with many computers for digital and electronic services.
- The involvement of students in helping run the library is a great idea. This not only supports the library staff but also gives students valuable experience. Seeing the active student assistants working at the American Corner was inspiring.
- The best part of the UMM Library is its diverse language and cultural corners, like the English, Japanese, Mandarin, and Australian corners, which their respective embassies support.
- The huge space the UMM Library allocates for every section and the reading areas were excellent.
- There was a very cosy prayer room on 2 floors.
- The best aspect of this library was its digital library collection and the library's interior design. The number of staff who work in the library is also impressive.
- The shelves were in black. I never thought I would see something like that. It was very nice. The arrangements of the books and the staffs' involvement were pleasant experiences.

- Their reading corners are fascinating. This kind of reading corner will be useful to the Maldives academic environment. Especially universities and colleges that have international partnerships.
- We should purchase different kinds of furniture & arrange furniture according to the user-needs, to create different environments for various types of people. Floor seating can create a vibe.
- The little shop-like space was interesting.
   Our public and academic libraries can have a food corner replicating this library.
- The Maldives should replicate and have dedicated trained staff for the different library tasks. We need more trained staff in the library field.
- Create dedicated areas for group study and collaborative work. These spaces can be set up with basic furniture and whiteboards to facilitate group discussions and teamwork.
- Encourage community involvement by establishing volunteer programs where individuals can contribute their time and skills to support library operations & events. The same for students too.
- We can beautify study spaces with beautiful views printed on canvas, and walls decorated by big picture frames.
- A prayer room/area can incentivise to stay at the library for long hours.
- We can introduce hotspot areas and recreation corner/room.





Kampung Nginden Gang 6l is a densely populated urban settlement located in East Surabaya, Sukolilo sub-district, Nginden Jangkungan village. Its people come from various cultural, educational, and occupational backgrounds that form strong family ties. The area of this village has dominant green open spaces and places that are utilised for environmentally conscious community-based activities (https://kampungherbalnginden.wordpress.com).

### **Participant Observations**

- The best part of the community reading room was the warm hospitality, the welcome dance performance by the children, and the fascinating traditional food and herbal drinks they shared. It was similar to our small island vibe back home.
- It is such a welcoming and engaging community space that demonstrates small spaces can be excellent libraries if there's a strong commitment to making it work. Even though the place is small they have utilised the area quite well. The resources they provide for the community are outstanding.
- I loved how they contribute to the community by giving spaces for discussions and workshops. The community engagement and educational programs such as workshops and information sessions/discussions mostly centre on herbal medicine.
- Focusing on creating a friendly and inclusive atmosphere in libraries, where community members feel valued and connected through activities surrounding local traditions is an excellent initiative.
- It is a unique library. In addition to the reading collection, they have various herbal ingredients and local products.
- The best aspect is its informal and accessible environment that encourages reading and learning.

- I hope we Maldivians also learn to create new ways to empower and enrich our small communities by making community reading rooms in different locations of the Maldives.
- It doesn't have to be large, but a space where the community can gather and feel welcome will be effective for a start.
- It would be good for the Maldives to display herbal ingredients we use in our traditional medicine. Our indigenous medicine knowledge is slowly fading away.
- Initiate and provide community reading areas or parks with the help of businesses and organisations. Partner with local schools, NGOs, and community groups to support and promote the reading rooms.
- Reading rooms can be set up in community centres, schools, or other public spaces, making it easy for people to access reading materials close to their homes.





Institut Teknologi Sepuluh Nopember (ITS), founded in 1957, is one of Indonesia's leading institutions for science, technology, and engineering education. Located in Surabaya, East Java, ITS has a reputation for producing highly skilled graduates who contribute significantly to the fields of engineering, technology, and research in Indonesia and beyond. Named after Indonesia's historic battle on November 10, 1945, during the fight for independence, ITS has become a hub for technological innovation and scientific research.

The Archive Centre of ITS, known as Arsip ITS, plays a crucial role in preserving and managing the institutional memory of ITS Surabaya. This archive serves as a central repository for historical records, official documents, and materials that document the university's evolution, achievements, and contributions to education and research in Indonesia.

Researchers, students, and faculty members can access the archive for academic and research purposes. While some materials may be available for public access, others may be restricted due to confidentiality or preservation concerns. The archive typically offers reading rooms for onsite research, and certain materials may also be digitised for easier access.

### **Participant Observations**

- The best aspect of the ITS was how committed they were to improve their administrative services within the institution.
- ITS Archives was well-organised and accessible.
- Uses their own herbal camphor.
- We got to see inside the archive and the materials that they use to protect the archived material.
- The archive room was interesting. The books were kept in a box with a little bag inside to keep bugs and fungi away. (These bags contain dried 'karubolak', 'hudhu kaafoora', and lemongrass

- Quick Takeaway Ideas to Replicate
- Maldives Archives could also adopt the practice of regularly hosting workshops or public talks to engage the community with archived materials, helping to foster a deeper appreciation of local history and culture. Additionally, creating partnerships with schools to encourage the use of archives in educational projects would be beneficial.
- The way they have shown their history through specific selected themes is interesting. Maldives could also do this to show history through a visual timeline.
- Our libraries could replicate the idea of maintaining a well-organised digital archive that makes local historical documents, photographs, and academic papers easily accessible to the public. This could be done at a low cost by starting digitisation of small collections and gradually expanding.
- We should implement a labelled and efficient box storage system instead of stacking documents haphazardly.
- We can also make semi-herbal camphor bags/pouches to protect our items from fungus. We should start work with whatever resources we have now.





Museum Angkut, located in Malang, East Java, Indonesia, is a one-of-a-kind transportation museum that showcases an extensive collection of vehicles from various eras and regions around the world. Opened in 2014, the museum is a popular tourist attraction, blending education with entertainment. The museum has over 300 collections of types of traditional to modern transportation. This is the first transportation museum in Southeast Asia.

**Vehicle Collection**: Over 300 vehicles, ranging from vintage cars, motorcycles, bicycles, and aeroplanes to traditional Indonesian transportation modes such as *becak* (3-wheel pedicab) and *andong* (horse-drawn carriage).

**Thematic Zones**: Several themed zones representing different countries and periods, such as the Hollywood Zone, and European Zone, each showcasing vehicles relevant to the region and era. **Interactive Experience**: The museum combines historical information with interactive and visually engaging displays, making it a fun and educational experience for all ages.

### **Participant Observations**

- The best part of the Angkut Museum is its immersive experience, with detailed exhibits showcasing various transportation items, presented engagingly and interactively for visitors.
- It was an impressive experience. We felt we were exploring multiple countries under one roof. The realistic sets made it incredibly engaging, giving us the sensation of actually visiting different places. The life-size items/photos with descriptions were awesome.
- The best aspect was the ability to see and touch the antique items I had only seen in pictures and movies before. The information displayed with the items was very helpful.

- The 3D map of Indonesia was just amazing. I would like to have a similar replica of our island in my library.
- Maldives could replicate the concept of creating interactive and themed exhibits in its museums, focusing on local history and culture. This could be done affordably by using local materials and stories.
- This approach could also include exhibits to celebrate the Maldives' unique history and maritime culture.
- We can have a library display area where we can display items that were in use in the earlier days in Maldives only.
- We can encourage Maldivians with private historical collections to open museums for the public.
- Our institutes or institutional libraries can display brief information with items/photos that are related to the institute. For example, Stelco can display their formerly used machinery.
- Our museum could introduce a gift shop, café, and rest areas (can outsource). This can help cultural tourism and help boost local arts and artisans.
- I wish to replicate the exit 'train' idea in our museum. We can have a local 'dhoani' with the same feel - with simulated waves!





The Alun-Alun Underground Museum is a unique and modern museum located beneath the iconic Alun-Alun Surabaya, Indonesia. This underground museum offers visitors a glimpse into the rich history and culture of Surabaya through its interactive exhibits and immersive displays.

### **Participant Observations**

- Informative display of Indonesian history. It is more like a gallery than a museum per se.
- I found out that the locals could advertise their work and get an income and at the same time, it was a place where a person could get recognition.
- I don't think or remember anything new in the underground museum that Maldives museums can replicate other than having a theatre.
- The best part of the Alun-Alun Underground Museum was its traditional and historical architecture, along with the cultural items preserved for years, reflecting their rich heritage.
- The lighting and the arrangement were impressive.
- I think such a museum will be very important for our country as we have a rich history of our country. For example, we can display our way of transportation by sea.
- The displays as well as the documentary playing on the wall were interesting. Would be good if our museum could also play documentaries or anything similar to our past, where anyone can watch by standing or sitting.
- The best aspect of the Alun-Alun Underground Museum is its innovative and immersive exhibition design and the enthusiasm of the museum staff.



- Maldives can replicate the use of music and projectors in its museums to enhance the experience, along with encouraging school students to use museum spaces for gatherings and educational activities.
- Focus on creating spaces where cultural heritage is showcased and respected. This can be applied to both museums and libraries across the islands, ensuring they serve as places of learning and community gathering.
- Each island can have space to display historical items and information about the island. Involve the community in the creation and curation of exhibits.
- Encourage local artists, historians, and residents to contribute artefacts.
- Showcase the history of our kings and queens at the 'Usgekolhu'. Usgekolhu is a two-story building in 'Sultan Park' which was built by a king for his wife. This is the only remaining building from the palace.
- Focus on creating exhibits that tell the unique stories and history of the Maldives.
   This will contribute to the local economy and promote cultural tourism.

Librarian's Role as a Research Consultant

#### **SESSION OVERVIEW**

They possess expertise in navigating databases, archives, and digital resources, which helps them support researchers in identifying relevant literature, accessing specialised materials, and utilising research tools effectively. Librarians also provide instruction on information literacy, data management, and citation practices, ensuring researchers use ethical and efficient methods. By staying current with new technologies and trends in academic publishing, librarians play a crucial role in enhancing the quality and impact of research across disciplines.

#### **Participant Observations**

- The session was very informative as we were guided on staying updated and informed on emerging trends and technologies.
- The best aspect of the session was the interactive approach, especially the quizzes made the session engaging and fun. The way they conducted the session was great. I loved it!
- I enjoyed the research session with Mentimeter and VOSViewer. I would have loved to have more exercises on using the latter.
- I learned a new presentation technique using Mentimeter and gained insights into identifying research topics that have not yet been studied.
- Having expertise in the library is essential for supporting research across different fields. Librarians should be well-equipped to assist patrons effectively. The session was valuable, emphasising the importance of these skills.
- The best part of the session was learning about SCOPUS, which
  provides librarians with access to scholarly content, citation analysis
  tools, and metrics for assessing research impact and quality. It would
  have been even more helpful to include practical examples or case
  studies on how librarians can effectively use these tools.
- The most memorable part of the session was realising how crucial algorithms are for mapping data.
- The entire session was excellent, and almost everything covered was new to me.

# WORKSHOP **SESSION 2**

#### **SESSION OVERVIEW**

The session on "Intelligent and Smart Archival Systems" was delivered in two parts and explored the integration of advanced technologies such as artificial intelligence (AI), machine learning, and automation in archival management. It addressed how these innovations enhance archival systems by streamlining processes like data classification, metadata generation, and content retrieval, leading to more efficient, accessible, and secure archives. Participants were exposed to emerging trends in smart archival solutions, including Al-driven search capabilities, and digital transformation strategies for optimal work performance.

#### **Participant Observations**

- This session provided useful information about the benefits of utilising smart digital tools in archiving including practical examples.
- Got familiar with the differences between traditional archives and Intelligent and Smart Archives. A chance to experience, and learn more about how to adopt, and manage intelligent and smart archival systems would have also been great.
- The best aspect of the session was the fascinating QR code integration for everything and the fantastic certificate mail merging techniques, which for me, was a new and easy way to create certificates.
- Great presentation which was very informative. Would have loved a longer practical session on how to preserve and maintain the archival materials would have been useful too.
- Record classification and organization were interesting and so was the concept of archival communities for students.
- Covering more on data privacy and security issues related to the use of AI and machine learning in archival systems would address concerns about protecting sensitive information.
- More details about the activities conducted by the archival community would have been useful. Also, it would have been great if we had a practical session on creating a semi-herbal archive.

### Saruna: A Digital Repository Initiative by the Maldives National University (MNU)

Nashfa began her career in the library field as a Library Trainee in 2004. She currently is the Librarian at Maldives National University (MNU), responsible for coordinating and conducting Information Literacy sessions for MNU library users, managing Saruna (the local digital repository), and overseeing the library collection. Additionally, Nashfa serves as a part-time lecturer at MNU. She has completed Bachelor of Arts Library & Information Management from MNU.





#### **Overview**

Saruna, created by MNU Library in 2018, was selected for showcasing because it is believed to be of value to fellow PDW-LIS participants and has the potential to scale up within the Maldivian landscape. MNU is an academic library and has the largest collection in the Maldives. These resources offer extensive access to international research content while access to local research materials. especially those written in the local language, remains quite limited. This gap in availability was a key factor driving the establishment of Saruna. The local word "Saruna" ("رُسرِيرِ بِرِي هُ مُرْسِرُ سُرِيرِ وَرُدُيَّرٌ") can be translated as light through the darkness. This reflects one of the main objectives of creating the digital repository: to make the untapped local content accessible. Additionally, it is my pleasure to discuss the future directions of Saruna, including the ongoing enhancements for indexing and retrieval efficiency. 
#### Takeaway from the PDW-LIS 2024

### National Archives of Maldives (NAM) Digital Preservation Project (DPP)



#### Presented by

#### **AMINATH SHIUNA**

Senior Archivist (Technical Director), The National Archives of Maldives

Shiuna began her career as a Librarian Trainee at a high school library in 1995. With more than 20 years in the LIS field, Shiuna currently is heading the Archives and Public Service Division of NAM with the responsibility to manage and supervise the archives related technical activities carried out at the organisation.

#### Overview

The NAM was established as a public legal entity under the Act (16/2011) on 19 December 2012. The initial phase of the DPP involved submitting two reports. The project commenced by conducting a nationwide survey to outline the requirements for the digital preservation system tailored to the NAM. Subsequently, the second part of the project focused on identifying the detailed specifications for the digital preservation system. This comprehensive effort spanned from the agreement signing on 6 December 2022 and successfully concluded on 30 June 2023, marked by the submission of the final report by the international consultant, Giaretta Associates, Pte, Ltd (UK). Next is to focus on securing the future of our archival materials through the creation of a secure and scalable digital preservation system which aligns with OAIS model and meets ISO 16363 standard and developing records management and digital preservation policies. This project ensures the enduring accessibility and integrity of Maldivian archival records.

#### Takeaway from the PDW-LIS 2024

"I gained extensive knowledge about various libraries, archives, and museums in Surabaya and Malang. The transportation museum, hand-made semi-herbal camphor, and mail merge technology were fascinating. The visited institutions reflect local culture and history through unique heritage preservation methods. Compared to the Maldives, libraries and archives in Indonesia are more advanced. The innovative practices, technologies, and memorable interactions with staff made this a valuable networking opportunity. 

#### Overview

Networking is a crucial skill, indispensable regardless of your business or experience level. # Legal Deposit Act of Maldives: National Library

Majida has been working at the National Library of Maldives (NLM) since 2005. Curranty working in the Legal Deposit Unit within NLM, she oversee technical operations, manage legal deposit materials, and develop the collection.





#### **Overview**

The subject of the presentation is the Legal Deposit Act (1/2006) that supports the national collection development at the National Library of Maldives. Every Maldivian publisher or author is required by this Act to submit two copies of their work. About 200 items were initially deposited in the first year. But we are unable to expedite the task because of a staffing shortage. Moreover, there is not a single article in the legislation that addresses electronic materials. Furthermore, there is a need to explore mechanisms to establish connections with writers and publishers. I am presenting these points to the workshop hoping to discuss these issues and brainstorm ideas with the workshop participants and Indonesian colleagues to help find effective solutions.

The National Library of Maldives faces significant challenges in digitisation, including limited funding and resources, which hinder the procurement of necessary technology and skilled personnel. The library struggles with preserving fragile, ageing documents and ensuring their accurate digitisation to make them accessible to a wider range of audiences through online platforms. Through continued efforts and collaboration, the National Library aims to enhance its digitisation initiatives and ensure that future generations can benefit from these invaluable resources.

#### **Overview**

The Centre for Higher Secondary Education library faces a significant shortage of space, which severely limits its capacity to serve over 1200 students effectively. Due to its small size, there is not enough seating, particularly during busy times such as the exam duration. The lack of dedicated areas for group discussion or quiet study rooms further hampers the library's functionality. The space constraint also restricts the number of bookshelves, limiting the acquisition of up-to-date resources. As a result, students often express concerns about the inadequate facilities, which impacts their overall learning experience and usage of the library.

#### **Overview**

The library's facilities include a circulation desk display area, a photocopy machine, touchscreen computers for database access, a seating area for socialising, a smart TV for presentations, and a diverse physical collection encompassing archival, government, legislative, legal, parliamentary, fiction, and non-fiction materials. Despite having excellent resources available to the 93 parliament members and over 160 staff, less than 1% utilise the library. Furthermore, I am concerned about collection development, noting that efforts to engage staff for support in this area have been challenging. Since the staff work closely with parliament members, their input is vital for developing a relevant and comprehensive collection. I hope to gain innovative ideas from this workshop in Indonesia to enhance library engagement and improve collection development.

Additionally, I advocate incorporating modern ICT facilities which is much needed to a modern library. Despite challenges, implementing such a guideline will set Maldives on the path to better libraries in the future and I hope to learn more from the workshop participants and facilitators.

Learning Outcomes & Implementation Planning- Future of the Maldives



#### Part 2. Discussion, Recommendations and Plan of Action

The assignment for participants to create presentations focusing on one of the three broad themes worked very well. All the pre-recorded video submissions were screened during the workshop session and offered insights into ongoing or planned projects. The discussions show that the colleagues face similar challenges, though on different scales. The session facilitated great conversations to plan the way forward and participants shared they were impressed with the work done by some of their colleagues. One project which particularly stood out was Project 'Saruna', the Maldives National University Library Digital Repository. The follow-up discussion was steered towards common challenges and potential projects that could be implemented in the short-term (1-2 years) to medium-term (3-5 years) for immediate benefits and impact.

### **Common Challenges & Potential Projects in the Short to Medium Term**

- Utilisation of library spaces. Two participants shared their proposed/approved plans for renovating libraries and the discussion revolved around adapting available spaces to meet seasonal user needs; storage of little-used library materials, etc.
- Collection management. Strategies for managing the collection more effectively viz a viz currency of the collection, space constraints, etc.
- Identifying information needs of users. The discussion revolved around the need to reach out to users in their comfort zones and the provision of targeted information services.
- The potential of opening an Education Centre library in an atoll to the community. Establish feasibility and timeline to start the project.
- Importance of networking for libraries. Explored the
  importance for the Maldives LIS community to establish
  formalised networking groups, for example, for the largest of
  the LIS community, the school librarians to engage more
  effectively with stakeholders and funders, and the
  development of guidelines.
- Developing a set of Guidelines for School libraries. The focus was on who should initiate and lead the project during the preliminary stages.

At the end of the session, the participants completed Worksheet 1, reflecting on the PDW-LIS 2024 experience and key takeaways for implementing the individual projects.

### **Individual Professional Development Journey**

Following a short presentation, participants completed Worksheet 2, Individual Professional Development Journey, which enabled them to focus on their career pathway. It was an opportunity for the participants to reflect on their professional and behavioural (soft) skill sets and steps to take to expand the skills portfolio based on their individual career plans.



#### **WORKSHOP SESSION 3**

Learning Outcomes & Implementation Planning: Future of Maldives LIS

#### Participant feedback

- We gained information on how the Maldives can overcome the challenges faced by the unique geographical and cultural context of the Maldives. I have better ideas of how libraries can advance their services through technological advancements.
- It was great to hear about the ideas some participants have planned for upgrading the services. I would have loved to be able to discuss more helpful tips about how to overcome the challenges we face.

- Interesting videos all the participants prepared. I wish more time had been allocated to discuss the topics covered by each participant.

- Suggestions on how to overcome the challenges we face, what the first steps can be, and so on would be very useful. We also require more time and discussion from both the Indonesian and Maldives sides.
- Gina Miss helped us to open our minds and not be restricted.
   She encouraged us to think critically about what we could do which was helpful.
- The best part of the session was the short videos by the participants -- their ideas. The discussions could be a bit longer (but I do understand that there were time constraints)
- The discussion on creating a network of libraries through our community and how we should have a Board with members who will make certain guidelines for all libraries to follow is insightful.
   If we can have the National Library implement it and be the backbone of this network, all the libraries of the Maldives can grow and advance to the level that we all dream of.
- The session was interesting as we heard about ideas or concerns about each participant in the workshop. Through the videos, we learned about the current status of their libraries and the future goals they have. It was inspiring.
- Many areas were identified that needed improvement. And it was interesting to listen to everyone's ideas and discussions. I wish we had one whole day to discuss this topic.



For future PDWL events, should there be more pre-departure meetings?




#### **Open Feedback for future** planning (Worksheet 3)
